

**BOROUGH OF SPRING LAKE  
MAYOR AND BOROUGH COUNCIL  
REGULAR MEETING  
AUGUST 9, 2016**

Mayor Naughton called the Reorganization Meeting of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Spring Lake to order at 6:30 P.M. with a moment of silent prayer. She then proceeded with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. The Mayor announced that the meeting is being held in accordance with the Open Public Meetings.

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**Workshop Discussion** – Water & Sewer Update

Mayor Naughton explained that water and sewer improvements have been made along Ocean Avenue, followed by paving completed by Monmouth County. She added that this has completed phase one of the water and sewer project.

Alan Hilla stated that phase one of the water and sewer project is complete. He explained that the scope of work was primarily the water main along the ocean front. He added that previous water mains were small in diameter, causing intermediate blooming. He explained that a twelve inch water main was installed which helps loop the system entirely around town. Through this project, about two miles of water main were installed along with the side connections at each of the side streets; valves were also installed to make the whole system work. Mr. Hilla added that sewer work was also completed during phase one. More access points to manholes were added making it easier to access the sewer line for cleaning and overall access, Mr. Hilla stated. Mr. Hilla continued by stating that it was discovered that many of the existing manholes were leaking when plugged. He added that grout was used on the manholes to repair the leaks saving about four million gallons per month; the Borough was paying to have clean water treated at the plant. The treatment cost is around twenty two hundred dollars per million gallons of water treated which works out to about one hundred thousand dollars a year. Mr. Hilla continued by discussing phase two which will consist of water and sewer work. He added that the water work will continue from the new water main on First Avenue and Atlantic Avenue and will continue up Atlantic Avenue for about two blocks and connect to a sixteen inch water main which currently exists. Phase three will consist of adding valves and hydrants Mr. Hilla stated. There will be approximately thirty to forty hydrants have already been identified, some of which are not operable, all of these improvements will make the system better. Mr. Hilla presented a map showing the sewer flows.

Mr. Hilla stated that two thirds of the town's sewage flow goes through the Pennsylvania Avenue pump station whereas one third goes through the Pitney Avenue pump station. He added that about three hundred homes which go to the Pitney Avenue pump station which processes about five gallons of sewage per home, when in reality it should be only processing about two to three hundred gallons per home. Mr. Hilla explained that the main focus of phase two will be the study and evaluation of sewage flow to Pitney Avenue.

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Mayor Naughton explained that it was not planned to go that part of town for the sewer until it became so obvious that there is an imbalance from the Borough sending so much sewage to SMRSA with so few homes.

Mr. Hilla explained that he would like to find two to two and a half million gallons a month going to the Pitney Avenue pump station that should not be. He explained that smoke testing and cross connection evaluations will have to be done to evaluate the sewer system; as well as sewer cleaning and televising and manhole inspections.

Mayor Naughton explained that the Borough pays per gallon to have the sewage treated by SMRSA; if there is flows into that via rain or holes the Borough is sending storm water to SMRSA to be treated needlessly and paying a fortune for it.

Mr. Dempsey added that the Borough knows how much is pumped from the well and what is sent to SMRSA is almost double of what is pumped.

Mayor Naughton stated that these are the results that the Borough was looking for.

Mr. Hilla explained that he is putting a proposal together now to do the evaluation on the sewer testing and should have recommendation by October.

Mayor Naughton thanked Mr. Hilla for his presentation.

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**Proclamations, Presentations, & Special Guests**

Mayor Naughton acknowledged the following Proclamation: FOP (Fibrodysplasia Ossificans Progressiva) Awareness on August 9, 2016.

**Eleanor Twomey Scholarship**

Mayor Naughton stated that Ilene Reagan Adams and her husband Bruce were very close friends of Eleanor Twomey; Ilene was unable to attend the meeting this evening to give out the awards however, her husband is.

Mayor Naughton explained that Eleanor Twomey was a longtime resident and business owner in town; she was a bright and interesting individual who was extremely committed to public service. This scholarship was put together to reward outstanding service and aspiring accomplishment from young women in our community. Mayor Naughton explained that last year was the first year and there is a provision put in place, if last year's scholarship winners continued to excel academically they would be considered for another scholarship this year. The winners for this year are Leah Parentela, going to Villanova School of Nursing, and Emma Clark, who will be attending Cornell. Winners from last year were presented with scholarships: Bridget Mastroilli, attending Rider University majoring in theater, and Carissa Mason, attending Stephens Institute of Technology, majoring in bio-mechanical engineering. Bruce Adams finished out the presentation stating Eleanor Twomey was a great person who continues to do great deeds.

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**Public Comments**

Sam Fleming, Tennis Court in Spring Lake Heights, stated that she reached out to both Mr. Dempsey and Mayor Naughton with concerns about the handicapped parking spaces at Pier beach.

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She feels the responses she received were negative. Ms. Fleming feels that handicapped parking spaces should be added rather than taken away.

Mayor Naughton explained that the initial email that she received concerned the location of the handicapped parking spaces and not the number of spaces. Upon receiving that email Mayor Naughton looked into the location of the spaces. The spaces have been moved since the boardwalk ramp ends closer to the area of the parking lot rather than along Ocean Avenue; the goal is to have the parking spaces as close to handicapped accessible areas as possible.

Ms. Fleming would like to see some more handicapped parking spaces in that area.

Mayor Naughton stated that this will be brought to the attention of the Police Chief.

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**Council Comments & Staff Reports:**

Mayor Naughton reported that Councilman Judge, Bryan Dempsey and she met with the fire department to make some recommendations for equipment and capital expenditures. Mayor Naughton added that they saw the draft of the report and are awaiting a final decision on recommendations before taking further action.

Mayor Naughton reported that she is pleased with the water/sewer work and hopes to see some return on investment.

Mr. Drasheff asked Mr. Dempsey if there has been any response to the liquor license accusation from the ABC (Alcohol Beverage Commission). Mr. Dempsey answered there has been no response; he will make another phone call.

Mr. Erbe reported that the rebuilding of the bridges over Spring Lake is going extremely well. He added that the public works will be finishing up the first bridge and starting the rebuild on the second soon.

Mr. Frost reported that the leaf removal in Spring Lake will be beginning August 15, 2016 for about twenty to thirty days.

Mr. Sagui reported that one third of the excess has been plugged from the Ocean Avenue sewer project. He thinks that once the area of Pitney and Vrooms Avenues is addressed there will be a significant amount of savings there too.

Mr. Sagui then reported that the BID is thinking of asking the council to change zoning for parking east of Third Avenue on Morris Avenue. He added that the BID is going to speak to the residents in that area to see how they feel. He explained that it is the only area in town where there are residential houses in a commercial zone with three hour parking.

Mr. Sagui then reported the BID would like to engage the Borough with some ideas to increase security in the GC and RC zones.

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**Borough Engineer's Report**

Mr. Avakian reported on Third Avenue improvements plans are well underway; the improvements from Brighton Avenue to Pitney Avenue. He explained that the plans will be ready to be sent to DOT (Department of Transportation) by the end of the month. Since it is a trust fund project, Mr.

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Avakian continued it will remain frozen by the State Governors Office. They will not review the plan and the borough cannot go out for bid without the funds. He hopes that something changes within the next month couple of months.

Mr. Avakian reported that there are two meetings scheduled for Wreck Pond on August 17, one is at Borough hall with Fish and Wildlife and the second is in Wall Township, which is a public meeting for Wreck Pond Storm Management group.

Mr. Judge asked if the Borough received approval to rake the beaches at Brown and York Avenues. Mr. Dempsey answered that he is unsure; the borough was granted approval a few weeks since the area was in need. He added that was miscommunication in regard to how far down to rake which was a little too far. Mr. Dempsey is going to make a call to see if he can rake the beach one more time.

Dolores Cacace, 104 York Avenue stated that she spoke with a person at DEP at one of the recent meetings and they said that the Borough could rake by hand up to the fence. Mr. Dempsey agreed however, it is almost impossible to do it by hand; the mechanical raking is much more efficient.

Mr. Avakian lastly reported that the micro-surfacing is complete; micro-surfacing is a layer of asphalt over the existing road to maintain the road for seven to ten years.

Elsie Dubac, 415 St. Clair Avenue asked about the paving repairs on Fifth Avenue. Mr. Dempsey answered that work will be done by the gas company and should be started within the next couple of weeks.

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**Borough Attorney's Report** – None

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**Borough Administrator's Report**

Mr. Dempsey reported on the paddle courts, the electrician will give a price to do the work. Mr. Dempsey added that the public works will begin work on the stairs so that people will be able to play hopefully in beginning of September.

Mr. Dempsey then reported that the tax revaluation inspections should be starting shortly; he is awaiting the state to give the okay on the contract. He explained that Realty Appraisals will take a neighborhood at a time and knock on the doors and if a resident is not home they will leave a notice with a telephone number to schedule an inspection. He is hoping they will get around town before residents leave for the winter.

Mr. Judge stressed the importance letting the inspectors into residents homes; if they do not the assessment may not be accurate or in the homeowners best interest.

Mayor Naughton added that there will be an opportunity after the new numbers are out to meet with the appraisal company if there are any questions or concerns.

Dolores Cacace, 104 York Avenue asked if the inspectors will be taking pictures and why. Mr. Dempsey explained pictures are needed in the case there is an appeal; they will be taking pictures of the front, back, and sides of each home, along with a few pictures of the interior, but not necessarily every room.

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Mr. Dempsey lastly reported that the Rutgers study presented the idea infrared technology to fix the trenches along the roads which have been opened to access water and sewer lines. He explained that the Borough has found a company and they will be starting within the next two weeks. After the roads are infrared, Mr. Dempsey continued the roads will then good candidates for micro surfacing within the next few years to get extra life out of the road, opposed to mill and pave the road from scratch.

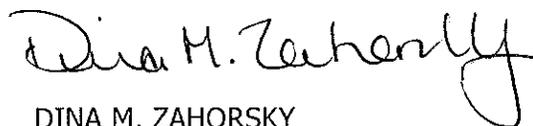
